

STATEMENT OF ENTITLEMENT

As a pupil of St Peter's High School and Sixth Form you are entitled to receive a student-centred programme of careers education, advice, information and guidance.

Your CEIAG programme will help you to:

- Understand yourself, your interests, likes and dislikes, what you are good at and how this affects the choices you make
- Find out about different further education and higher education courses, what qualifications you might need and what opportunities there might be
- Develop the skills you may need for working life
- Make realistic, but ambitious, choices about courses and jobs
- Develop a plan of action for the future
- Gain an understanding of the different post 16 options available such as staying on at sixth form, going to college or completing an apprenticeship.
- Gain an understanding of the different post 18 options available such as going to university, completing an Apprenticeship, taking a GAP Year or starting work.
- Be able to make effective applications for jobs, training, further and higher education
- Develop your interview skills
- Improve your confidence

You will receive:

- Careers lessons as part of the Citizenship Programme
- Presentations, visits, virtual work experience and workshops as part of the Year 12-13 Futures Programme
- A weekly Careers Bulletin for students in years 10-13, outlining local and national careers information, labour market information, work experience opportunities, HE, FE and apprenticeship updates.
- Impartial careers interviews with the school's Careers Advisor and an individualised Career Action Plan.
- Virtual work experience opportunities in Years 10 and beyond.
- Other subject lessons linked to careers
- A bi-annual Careers Fair with approximately 40 plus exhibitors from local businesses, apprenticeship providers, colleges and universities
